Please find the below contribution from Andrew Bowie MP for your consideration.

It has been a busy start to 2025! I have received a huge level of correspondence on the issue of energy infrastructure. This is an issue that isn't going away and that so many of you rightly feel strongly about. As you know I am extremely concerned about the sheer scale of energy infrastructure hitting our part of the country. With pylons, substations, battery storage, wind farms and solar farms, the impact is vast.

The stated purpose of the energy transition is to protect our environment, not concrete over it. The Mearns and Deeside should not bear the brunt of this in the way it is being ex-



pected to. I have had many meetings with local residents, business owners and action groups where concerns have been made clear. I have met with SSE and others to push home these points, particularly on offshoring and undergrounding. I will continue to speak up in Parliament about the importance of working with local communities, not against them, and funding agreeable solutions. If we are putting in infrastructure that will last for generations, we have a moral responsibility to do it right.

I have also been dismayed by the current government's approach to farmers. They are the backbone of rural communities like ours and do a huge service to the country, providing homegrown food at a fair price. The capital costs are high, and the returns are low, which makes an inheritance tax of this sort immensly damaging to family farms and our future food security. We need to encourage more young people into the industry, which has already been struggling with increasing costs and vanishing margins. I will continue to work with local stakeholders to raise concerns, including on our declining cattle numbers and the Fruit and Vegetable Aid Scheme.



Another important industry for our area, the North Sea oil and gas industry, is at a crossroads — and the decisions being made by the Labour government in Westminster are pushing it towards an accelerated decline. This isn't just about energy policy; it's about jobs, economic stability and the future of our communities in the North East of Scotland. In March, we saw yet another betrayal of our workforce. Labour's announcement that the Energy Profits Levy will remain in place until 2030 (which means a total tax rate of 78%) is disastrous for the sector. Their refusal to issue new North Sea drilling licenses only worsens the uncertainty. This isn't a "managed transition" — it is a deliberate, reckless dismantling of an industry that has powered Britain for decades. And as a result, investment is drying up, projects are being shelved and skilled workers are leaving. These decisions will cost the UK economy £12 billion in lost tax revenue and another £12 billion in lost capital investment — throwing away money that could be used to fund a better path to net zero ambitions. Worse still, shutting down our own domestic production doesn't reduce emissions — it outsources them to foreign suppliers, increasing reliance on imported liquefied natural gas (LNG), which has a far higher carbon cost. We are already too reliant on imports (which make up over 40% of our energy mix), and while demand for hydrocarbons exists to heat our homes and power our transport network, we should maximise domestic production and tax revenue.

Biodiversity

Aberdeenshire Council is now exploring different areas where we can see areas of biodiversity develop, and with budgets being stripped bare, it would be more for communities to maintain and bring these forwards.

Some of these directives are coming from Scottish Government, but representing a rural Council area, we are surrounded by a combination of managed and wild landscape. Even areas where we wish to create a wild habitat, that needs to be managed so that it will not get overwhelmed by aggressive natural species like couch grass, docks, nettles, willow herb or ragwort which although colourful is poisonous to many animals.

Similarly on mammal loss, we need to re-examine species which have been protected in the past, and for good reason. Badgers were protected to encourage numbers to rise and to return a bit of balance to our countryside, however that needs to be monitored. Numbers are increasing at a rate where we are now seeing the carnage on our roads at night of adult badgers and cubs. The suffering to these iconic creatures to my mind is now unacceptable and numbers need to be reviewed. Also it is well known that hedgehogs are a delicacy for badgers where they eat them, leaving only the skins, so we cannot blame climate change or farmers on their decline when we have altered the balance of nature. Similarly these of us who live and work in the countryside see the effect on underground bumble bee nests as they again are a dug up and eaten by badgers.

All of us who are born and bred in the countryside are well aware of these balances, and especially our game keepers who understand the need to create space for all species. Lat-

terly my inbox has been filling up with complaints on seagulls, again a protected species that also needs reviewing.

So the lesson is if we alter the balance of nature, be careful what we wish for.!

Spring Gardening Tips for Auchenblae GROK AI

As Spring unfurls its green tendrils across Aberdeenshire, Auchenblae gardeners are itching to dig into the season. With the frost retreating and the days getting longer, now's the perfect time to breathe new life into our village plots. Whether you're tending a sprawling garden or a few pots by the doorstep, here are some tips to make your spring a blooming success.

First, let's talk soil. After winter's chill, your garden beds might be compacted and craving attention. Grab a fork and gently loosen the earth, mixing in some well-rotted compost or manure—local suppliers often have plenty to spare. This'll give your plants a nutrient-packed start. If you're growing in containers, refresh that tired old potting mix with a fresh batch to keep roots happy.

March and April are prime for sowing hardy annuals like marigolds, sweet peas, and calendula. These beauties thrive in our cool spring air and add a splash of colour by summer. Indoors, get a jump on tomatoes, peppers, and courgettes—pop them on a sunny windowsill until the last frost passes, likely mid-May for us. For those with a polytunnel or greenhouse, you're already ahead of the game—start your salads now and enjoy fresh greens by Easter.

Don't forget the veg patch! Early potatoes—think Rocket or Pentland Javelin—can go in once the soil warms to about 6°C (stick your finger in; if it doesn't feel icy, you're good). Carrots, parsnips, and broad beans are also tough enough to handle our temperamental spring weather. Sow them direct and watch them sprout as the days lengthen.

Pruning's on the agenda too. Tackle those overgrown roses and fruit bushes before they burst into growth—cut back to healthy buds to encourage vigorous blooms and berries. And while you're at it, give your tools a once-over. A sharp pair of secateurs makes all the difference, and a quick scrub keeps rust at bay.

Pests are waking up too, so keep an eye out. Slugs love our damp climate—beer traps or a ring of crushed eggshells around young plants can deter them without fuss. Aphids might also fancy your new shoots; a blast of soapy water usually sends them packing.

Finally, embrace the wild side. Leave a corner of your garden for nettles or wildflowers—our local bees and butterflies will thank you, and it's one less spot to weed! Speaking of community, if you've got spare seedlings or cuttings, why not share them at the next village gathering? Auchenblae's gardens thrive when we swap tips and treasures.

So, dust off your trowel, soak up that spring sun, and let's make this season a cracker. Happy gardening, Auchenblae!

And for those who don't fancy digging there is also "No dig" gardening as mentioned in the article from Fiona at Westerton.

What is No dig gardening? Answer thanks to Grok.

No-dig gardening is a method of growing plants without tilling or turning the soil. Instead of digging, gardeners build up layers of organic matter, such as compost, mulch, or manure, on top of the existing soil. This approach mimics natural soil-building processes and aims to preserve soil structure, encourage beneficial microorganisms, and reduce weed growth.

Here's how it typically works:

1. **Start with a base layer**: Lay down cardboard, newspaper, or another biodegradable material to smother weeds and grass.

2. **Add organic layers**: Pile on compost, straw, leaves, or other organic materials to create a nutrient-rich growing medium.

3. **Plant directly**: Sow seeds or plant seedlings into the top layer, allowing roots to grow down into the decomposing material.

Maintain: Keep adding mulch or compost over time to feed the soil and suppress weeds.

The benefits include less physical labour, improved soil health, better water retention, and a reduction in soil erosion. It's popular among organic gardeners and those looking for sustainable, low-maintenance gardening techniques. Charles Dowding (https://

www.charlesdowding.co.uk) is a well-known advocate of this method, if you're curious to dig deeper—pun intended!

My Annual Report 2024/25 will have dropped through your letterboxes by now, and it is my honour as a North East MSP to be a voice for local residents in the Scottish Parliament and to share with you some of the local issues I have been responding to.

Communities across Angus and Aberdeenshire have been blindsided by plans to industrialise our countryside with monster pylons and huge substations. For the past two years, constituent correspondence on new energy infrastructure in the North East has flooded my inbox. No other issue—not a single issue—has come close. I have attended town hall meetings on the plans, met with campaign groups, including Angus Pylon Action Group and Save our Mearns, visited constituents and heard firsthand the impact this is having on their homes, health and livelihoods. I believe this is the wrong kit in the wrong place and I will do everything I can to oppose the industrialisation of our beautiful land.

From having a career in the Energy sector, safety is always at the heart of everything I do. Both physical and psychological safety. In my role as Shadow Minister for Equalities I will continue to fight for the legal requirement for single sex services in our public buildings



such as schools, hospitals and leisure centres, to be upheld. Inclusion must not come at the expense of the safety, dignity and privacy of women and girls.

During my last meeting with Councillor George Carr and Councillor Tracey Smith at the Clatterin' Brig we discussed a wide range of local issues such as primary and secondary healthcare, the Invercarron Resource Centre, the Fordoun and Laurencekirk Junctions and council funding shortfalls. On local issues your local councillors are always there to help. It seems like such a long time ago now but my

Christmas card design for last year was a real community effort. Mearns and Coastal Healthy Living Network was the chosen local charity, and they submitted photos from their many groups and activities across the Shire. Pupils at Glenbervie Primary School then voted for their favourite image and the winning design appeared on my Christmas card sent to homes and businesses across the North East. I was delighted to attend a special assembly at Glenbervie Primary School and hand deliver their winning Christmas card design.

Last month I joined the community café in Inverbervie as they hosted an afternoon of Tai

Chi in the local Scouts Hall. After the pace of Holyrood, it was a wonderful way to balance both body and mind. Health matters, especially rural health, are still a major concern. Pressures on the NHS, Scottish Ambulance Service and Health and Social Care teams grow and with services stretched our hardworking rural GPs and staff need our support.

Recently I was invited to speak with pupils at Mearns Academy in Laurencekirk and Mackie Academy in Stonehaven. Their Modern Studies classes have been learning all about The Scottish Parliament and the



Tess White cont.—role of an MSP. The Q&A sessions at the end were especially interesting, and we might just have some future MSP's or maybe even a First Minister in our midst.

A real highlight of being an MSP is getting to bring forward cross-party parliamentary motions recognising success or raising awareness for local groups, businesses or individuals across our community. It was a delight to submit a motion for Poppies Pre-school Nursery in Laurencekirk as they were nominated for Nursery of the Year at the Nursery World Awards 2024, and the only nursery from Scotland to be selected. It was good to chat with you this morning at the Parish Church coffee morning in Laurencekirk's Dickson Hall. Thank you for your time.

As mentioned, I'm currently supporting the churches across the Mearns in Fettercairn, Auchenblae, Glenbervie, Luthermuir, Marykirk and Laurencekirk with their development needs. This is including community engagement processes through varying means to help reconnect churches and communities. Although driven by faith, this is not necessarily about that, but is a way to remind people that the church is there for more than just Sunday worship or life's events. I'm doing this with communities across Scotland and in some cases, helping with developments of facilities and programmes to provide what the community are needed, and in others, facilitating a discussion with a community group who may wish to develop their own things from within the premises.

At present, I have survey's running in Laurencekirk, Auchenblae and Fettercairn. We did Luthermuir at the end of last year along with Fettercairn, but have extended the Fettercairn research for various reasons. 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
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Auchenblae Bowling Club

Farming Update Fiona Gammie

Hello from a sunny Westerton

Its been such a wonderfully weird spell of weather with frosty mornings and sunny days – lovely to have those days stretching now. Whilst the clock change is always a welcome time in the farming calendar, I do feel slightly aggrieved it is happening on Mothering Sunday this year!

Westerton has been busy these last few weeks with our sowing underway – Laurette Spring Barley going in the ground, destined for the malting market. We have a wonderful relationship with Fettercairn Distillery as part of their 200 club where we supply barley to that distillery specifically – the maltings keep all the 200 club grain separate from their other piles so we know that our barley is being used in the Fettercairn whisky which is a great piece of provenance. We use a combination of a more traditional sowing method with a one pass drill, and a minimum tillage drill. The minimum tillage drill gives much less disruption to the soil ecosystem and in theory should help promote active soils, which results in healthier crops.

Rosie is busy sowing seeds for the veg patch, we have managed to clear our second tunnel so we will be introducing our no dig beds in here. The no dig science is quite fascinating, and in theory should mean a lot less weeding and more plantable space. We will have our usual array of colour and variety including cauliflower, cabbage, kale, spinach, salads, beetroot, spring onions, carrots, sprouts, tatties, flowers and strawberries.

We had a very sad start to the year when it comes to our Animals. Unfortunately two of our Alpacas became very poorly and had to be put to sleep, and just a few weeks ago we said a very sad goodbye to our beloved farm dog Luna. She was such a big hit at the farm with all our visitors and we are really missing her. Our other animals are all thriving, we have 3 goats, 9 chickens, 2 Alpacas and 2 deer. We are going to be adding to our farm with the addition of cattle and more chickens this year too. We have animal experience days available to book onto where you can come and help us look after them, and interact with all the animals. We are also offering animal therapy sessions for local charities working with venerable young people/adults so if this is of interest to you or your charity please drop us an email – Fiona@Westertonfarmers.co.uk

We are going to be focusing a lot on wellness at Westerton going forward, we have loads of fun plans to help introduce ways to make our lives a bit healthier, happier and more balanced. We will be hosting a wellness day in June which will have a bunch of local wellness businesses, practices and activities for people to explore and try out. We are going to help show how introducing small changes into day-to-day life can really enhance our overall wellbeing. Keep an eye on our socials for more information on this.

As part of this wellness focus we will be introducing salads to our menu this summer, using our own homegrown veg, along with good protein sources and lovely home-made dressings – we will be moving away from ultra processed items and onto whole foods packed with nutrition and flavour. We are working with a local nutrition specialist to help us really make the most of what we grow.



Monday 31 Mar - Wednesday 9 Apr

At the turn of the month, settled weather is expected to cover much of the UK. Most places are expected to be dry with clear or sunny spells and light winds. Inland areas will see a general day on day warming next week, but cooler near coastal areas, with an additional risk of mist or sea fog affecting parts of the east coast. Some periods of unsettled weather could develop at times. If this happens any rain or showers are most likely to affect southern or western areas. However the main signal is for dry and fine weather across the country. Temperatures will likely be around or above normal and feeling warm during the day, and some cold nights are still possible when skies are clear.

Wednesday 9 Apr - Wednesday 23 Apr

Slow-moving (or blocked) weather patterns are most likely through the middle of April. High pressure located to the N of the UK will probably be dominant for much of the time, bringing a lot of fine and dry weather. If wetter, more unsettled weather develops, this is most likely to affect the south of the UK. Temperatures are likely to be close to or slightly above average overall, although some cold nights are possible.
